MFAR inspects, audits, and recognises hotels and other tourism products and services that meet the faith-based needs of Muslim travellers. This serves as a quality assurance for cleanliness, hygiene and quality service and a valuable and non-intrusive initiative that enhances the value of Malaysian tourism products and services without imposing undue burdens on the tourism industry players and operators.

Meanwhile, MFTG equips tour guides with the necessary skills and knowledge to cater to the Muslim tourist market, providing them with an unforgettable travel experience. The training programme covers Islamic Tourism concept, Muslim tourist needs, the Malaysian Standard (MS) 2610 – Muslim-Friendly Hospitality, Halal and Shariah concepts, and effective communication skills, among others.

ITC's efforts have not gone unnoticed. In 2021, it received the Strategic Business Alliance Award at The BrandLaureate World Halal Best Brand E-Branding Awards 2021, and the Best Islamic Tourism Leadership Gold Award 2021 by Malaysia Tourism Council. These accolades are a true testament to ITC's unwavering dedication and innovative strategies in navigating the "new normal" of the business landscape, while simultaneously driving growth and sustainability in the Islamic tourism sector in Malaysia.

Meanwhile, Malaysia was named the top country in the world in the State of the Global Islamic Economy (SGIE) 2022 report, and continued to hold the top spot as the most sought-after destination for Muslim travellers in the MasterCard-CrescentRating Global Muslim Travel Index (GMTI) since 2015. These remarkable achievements are a clear reflection of ITC's hard work and tireless efforts in elevating Malaysia's position as a premier destination for Muslim travellers.

Malaysia's focus on the MFTH sector has helped create a more inclusive and welcoming environment for Muslim travellers. By catering to their specific needs and preferences, Malaysia has set a standard for how nations can create a niche tourism market that is not only profitable but also promotes diversity and tolerance.

- Discover the rich and vibrant culture of Sarawak at the Borneo Cultures Museum (BCM) in Kuching. With five levels of themed exhibitions showcasing the region's diverse traditions and lifestyles, BCM is a fascinating and educational journey for all visitors. The building itself is quite a sight to behold.
- Right next door to BCM lies the Sarawak Islamic Heritage Museum, which was first built in 1930 as Madrasah Melayu Sarawak. In 1992, it was reopened as a museum with seven galleries showcasing different aspects of Islamic history and culture in Sarawak.
- The Sultan Tengah Mausoleum at Jalan Sultan Tengah in Santubong houses the tomb of Sarawak's only sultan and offers a glimpse





into the state's fascinating past. The tomb was first discovered in 1993 in Kampong Batu Buaya, and the mausoleum is located near some of Santubong's many attractions.

- Head to Sarawak Cultural Village, where you can watch traditional performances and explore life-sized replicas of traditional ethnic homes of Sarawak. This "village" offers a unique and immersive journey into the state's rich cultural heritage.
- From the historic Kuching Old State Mosque dating back to 1840, to the stunning Kuching Floating Mosque at sunset, the mosques of Kuching are a must-see for Muslim tourists. Soak in the beauty and history of these majestic structures and witness the Region's devotion to their faith.
- Take a river taxi known as Penambang across the Kuching Waterfront to Kampung Boyan and enjoy traditional Malay snacks, dishes, and seafood while enjoying traditional Malay performances such as bermukun.
- Prepare to journey back in time at Niah National Park in Miri, where the oldest human remains in Southeast Asia were discovered. The park boasts an array of fascinating caves and archaeological sites to explore, as well as a lush rainforest teeming with exotic flora and fauna.
- Get ready to be captivated by the awe-inspiring wonders of Mulu, also in Miri! Start your adventure with a visit to the breath-taking Deer Cave in the afternoon, just in time for the unforgettable sight of thousands of bats taking flight later in the evening. The next morning, hop on a boat and head to the mesmerising Clearwater Cave. And if you're up for a more challenging exploration, the Pinnacles will leave you awestruck.
- Dive into the wonders of Miri's vibrant marine life at the Miri-Sibuti Coral Reefs National Park and be amazed by the thriving coral reefs that are

- considered among the most beautiful in the world. From exploring shipwrecks to spotting majestic creatures like sharks and whales, the possibilities for adventure and discovery are endless.
- The Sibu Central Market in Sibu is the largest indoor market in Malaysia. This bustling marketplace houses thousands of stalls and shops offering anything from fresh produce to general merchandise. What's more, the market merges the former wet market and the native Lembangan market into one clean and hygienic space.
- Step into the Sibu Heritage Centre. Originally built in 1963 as the Sibu Municipal Council, this historic building was transformed into the Sibu Heritage Centre in 2011. Explore the museum's fascinating exhibits, which showcase the diverse ethnic groups of central Sarawak and Sibu's history. Learn about the legendary Rosli Dhobi, a prominent figure in Sarawak's history.

With its rich and diverse offerings, Sarawak has so much for Muslim tourists to discover and explore, while enjoying the comforts of a faith-based lifestyle, thanks to its active development of Muslim-Friendly Tourism and Hospitality.
